



Grow, Grow

If you watch really closely, at this time of year in particular, you can hear the truth of that wonderful line in Bereishit Rabba, "There is not a single blade of grass that doesn't have a constellation in the heavens pulling it forward and saying to it, 'grow'". (10:6)

The seasons are changing, the days are longer, Shabbat comes in slightly less crazily early, there are buds on the otherwise scrawny hydrangea in the Synagogue garden, readying to explode into foliage and my favourite dwarf witch hazel's yellow blossom are already

braving the winter cold.

It's a little early, still, for fruit tree blossom, but this is the blessing to be said on seeing the first fruit tree blossom in the year;

"Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Ruler of the Universe, who has made nothing lacking in God's world, and created in it good creatures and good trees to give pleasure to human beings". (Talmud Brachot 43b)

It's always good to have the text ready, much like the boy in the poem by Hannah Yerushalmi cited by Rabbi Natasha where an 8 year-old carries "emergency confetti" in his pocket, "everywhere / just in case / there is good news."

We mark Tu Bishvat this Sunday night with a wonderful celebration at New London. Rabbi Jonathan Wittenberg is joining us. We have Muslim participation, a presentation on swifts and Chen Reiss will be singing. It's an opportunity to acknowledge our place in this beautiful but fragile world, to feel closer to it and, perhaps above all, to feel touched by the possibility of good news that is slowly reaching out into the wintry light.
