



Tefillah - Express Wonder

I'm not worried about the business of our services on first day Rosh Hashanah. I know it will be busy. Actually, it might even be too busy. For me, it's the Maariv services and Second Day services where I really get to experience Tefillah. I would urge all of us to make the effort to be in Shul at a time when it's easier to find that extraordinary blend of private & communal, reflective & liturgical, song & silence.

Maariv services are beautiful – and short. 6:30 pm Monday and Tuesday night. Or come earlier in the day – we start at 8:30 am. Arrive, sit, let the experience of being in Shul seep in. Expressing wonder takes time and it's

actually easier when not surrounded by the scores of lovely people we might not have seen since this time last year. No need to log in, the computer can be switched on before Yom Tov and left to run. We've made a substantial investment in new cameras to increase reliability and visibility.

Tzedakah - Charity

That's a bad translation. Charity, from Latin, suggests a kind of pity. The Hebrew has a stronger connotation, do what is just. But the English translation suggests financial support in a way I find important. In the Mishnah the Rabbis make the clear call that every person has an obligation to give financially, even those supported through charity. It's a nice way of cutting through the thing that stops me - do I have enough for myself, so there is something left over I can give away? The answer to that question is, of course, yes. We have, together with the Magazine, sent out our Kol Nidrei Appeal letter to membership. We are hugely grateful for the financial support which allows the community to survive, and thrive.
